EARL HAIG STARTS CAMPAIGN.

Earl Haig, who commanded the British forces in France during the war, presided at a meeting of the Council of the British Legion on Friday, when plans were completed for a big campaign which was launched on Saturday.

Every man who served in the war, whether as an officer or in the ranks is wanted as a member of the Legion and until April 8 the campaign will be energetically carried out all over the country.

On Sunday there will be church parade in practically every town, and the sermons will have special reference to the Legion. The Penzance Branch attended morning service at St John's Church on Sunday.

The British Legion exists for the purpose of bringing all classes of ex-service men together in organised comradeship, and its valuable social and educational effort is only limited by the fact that there are still thousands of ex-service men who have not joined.
